FINANCE TEAM

The role of the Finance Team is to ensure that First Presbyterian Church has the financial ability to meet its mission. It is responsible for compliance with all financial sections of the Book of Order of the Presbyterian Church USA, including budgeting, oversight of payroll and expenses, proper accounting of offerings and donations, and regular and accurate reporting of financial matters to Session and the congregation.

As we review the financials of 2024, we are again reminded of the wonderful and generous members of First Presbyterian. *Our church ended the year in very good financial condition and with expectations of continued positive results for 2025.*

Results from work of the Finance Team in 2024 include:

- Our annual review by CPA, Lucy Kiel, revealed a very positive annual review as required by the Book of Order.Ms. Kiel will not be doing our review going forward as she continues her retirement. A big word of thanks for her work and the training she has provided over the years.
- Our online giving program continue for the convenience of our donors.
- We developed and presented the 2025 budget to the Session for approval. The budget is included later in this report for the congregation's information. Our team studied a different budget tool, we developed the budget without pledges believing that our congregation would guarantee the Good Lord's will be done and our offering needs met. We did ask our members to make a pledge known only by themselves and God which will be mailed back to them sometime after mid-year.
- The balance of our loan, which was used to build the parking lot, install the elevator, build the Upper Room, etc., continues to be paid down at a good pace. We anticipate 2025 offerings for this purpose will continue and the progress will continue as well.

- We owe a SPECIAL THANK YOU to Nancy Thompson our treasurer, for many years in that very necessary job. Nancy provided her time with free gratis and made our records very readable, very factual, timely, and did it all with a kind smile. She told us during the 2024 budget time that this would be her last year, and finally toward the end we identified a person to do the accounting, (an introduction later). Nancy will continue to be part of our team.
- Our new accountant is Jenny Price She has done a wonderful job getting started and has great qualifications as she works as an accountant in Waynesville. We look forward to working with Jenny.
- Melonie Gross will continue her work as assistant treasurer. Roger Gilbertson has taken on responsibility helping Melonie, Jenny and the Finance team.
- Nancy served as treasurer for our church, and with this change our Finance Chair, Mike McKinney, will hold the corporate title of Treasurer, as required by corporate law.

Goals and Objectives of the Finance Team for 2025:

- Monitor income and spending to ensure finances are in line with expectations and budget. Make sure our congregation is aware of the state of our finances, and they we apprise them regularly.
- Continue to advise our congregation about our progress toward paying our loan off which was used for the elevator, parking lot, Upper Room, etc.
- Plan and roll out Stewardship Program for 2026.
- Collect, organize and distribute "Time and Talent" information to Session Members.
- Prepare 2026 budget, submit to Session members prior to the end of the year for their approval prior to our congregation meeting.
 (By the time you have read this report, our congregation will have approved our pastor's call and heard about our new budget for 2025. Thanks again to our congregation for allowing your Finance Team to present this report, for the great, prayerful questions, and for the consensus we felt.)

The Year-end 2024 Financial Report, along with the Budget for 2025, can be found in the final pages of this annual report.

Thank you so much to our finance team made up of Nancy Thompson, Melonie Gross, Lee Hays, Rich Downs and Roger Gilbertson. ENDOWMENT PROGRAM - MIKE McKINNEY -

Our Endowment Program is a way for members and friends to make special gifts that are invested for the long term, or possibly for one of the programs the Endowment Fund administers, or in some cases it may be money temporarily invested and to be used as requested or per Session direction. The hope would be that as funds grow the investment income could be used for the benefit of the church's finances. The gifts may come to the church in any form as described in church policy, and could be real estate, stock, bonds, or other objects of value.

The Endowment Program began in 2018, the balance as of December 31, 2024 was \$161,267.15, and we anticipate this will grow in 2025 as directed by estates and special gifts. During 2024 our goals were to maximize our earnings safely, to continue the recruitment of money to the fund, and to continue our College Education Awards.

The Chimes Choir continued to enjoy the third octave purchased last year by playing full musical arrangements com-


posed for three octaves. The Chimes Choir played during summer worship services as well as during Lent and Advent. Their warm tones added beautiful harmonies to our worship!


In May, the Discipleship Team hosted a Library "Grand Reopening" following the Sunday service. In preparation, a new sign in the style of the current wayfinding signs was posted in the hallway outside the door making it easier to spot the library's location. The decoratively carved sign previously on the door dedicating the library to Ruby Daniel was moved into the library proper and displayed on the wall with a photo of her.

Discipleship: The journey of growing in our faith.

A huge THANK YOU goes out to team members Riley Covin, Andrea Croskery, Van Davis, Cherole Volin, Billye Simmers and Judi Crane, chair of the Earth Care Team, which was moved from the umbrella of Building and Ground to the Discipleship Team.

The team worked to enhance and support the faith of individuals in the congregation at FPCW.

The team sought to fulfill this missionwith Sunday morning discipleship classes, speakers, summer movies with spiritual intent, ongoing updates and improved access to the church's library.

The discipleship classes offered varied opportunities for study and growth of the participants' faith journey. The Seekers class studied *Words of Life* by Adam Hamilton, *Making All Things New* by Henri Nouwen, *Celebration of Discipline* by Richard Foster and the book of Romans. The Isaacs class concluded their study of the book of John in addition to Proverbs and James. They also studied *Mere Christianity* by C.S. Lewis.

The two classes decided to rejoin for the last quarter of the year. We studied Caring For Words in a Culture of Lies, then two curricula from Thoughtful Christian, Reformed Spirituality by Stephen Shusset before starting an Advent study, Finding Your Place in the Manger by Krin Van Tatenhove.

We had three special speakers this year.

Two were from local agencies to increase our knowledge of the activities and availability of services in our community.

Patsy Davis, Director of Mountain Projects
DeLisa Ensley, Patient Liaison at
Haywood County Hospice and Palliative Care.

Our third presenter was Agness Nyanda, Principle Hospital Administrator at the Nkhoma Mission Hospital in Malawi which our congregation supports. She just "happened" to be in our area which was such

a blessing to hear first hand of the vital services this Hospital provides.

The format for our summer movies changed this year include a light lunch and starting after the fellowship time which increased the number of people participating.

The three movies included *The Shack, War Room,* and Chronicles of Narnia.

BUILDING & GROUNDS - RICK CROSKERY -



After several rather hectic years, the Building and Grounds team had a slightly quieter one in 2024.

We began the year by completing the kitchen renovation that was started in 2023. We completed the new pantry shelving and door thresholds, repairing the longstanding broken tiles in the upstairs hallway in the process. The vendor had sent a couple of custom cabinets that were the wrong size, and

after sending correct replacements, told us we could keep them, so Morgan McNeil assembled them into the attractive beverage cart we use at fellowship time. Our new dish sanitizer was put into use, allowing us to wash lots of dishes quickly. We have essentially stopped using paper and Styrofoam, furthering our mission to be earth-friendly.

After updating the kitchen, the office hallway was looking a little dated, so it was given a fresh coat of paint. Now everything looks nice. Thanks to "honorary" team member Wes Lee for that and for repainting all of the older cabinets in the kitchen to match the new custom ones.

In the spring, Van Davis and Rick Croskery installed a row of LED fixtures under the duct channel in the parlor which have really helped to brighten the dim side of that room. We also had the old incandescent fixture in the Main St parking lot light replaced when it failed with a brighter and more efficient LED fixture. Rick and Morgan completed wiring and placing security cameras so that we are now monitoring all major building entrances.

Bo Prevost continued her faithful weeding and pruning in our garden beds, and Rick continued to maintain our foundation plantings, mulching, and adding to the native garden behind the courthouse parking lot.

Some of the gutter along Main Street was bent and developed leaks, including one directly over the tower steps. The bad sections were replaced in June, and all the other gutter was professionally inspected and pronounced sound. Pretty good for a 40-year-old gutter!

Due to the two episodes of water damage which occurred in late 2022, our insurance carrier required us to install "FloLogic" leak detection devices on both of the church water supplies. This was done in January. Unfortunately, they were too sensitive, and a leaking toilet or dripping faucet would cause them to turn off the water completely. Though it was simple to turn the water back on, it was certainly an inconvenience. We appear to have all minor leaks fixed and the devices adjusted properly now, such that there have been no recent inappropriate shutoffs. Now that they are working properly, these devices should prevent us from having a future episode of significant water damage.

The Russ Avenue widening project began this year, causing disruption along Walnut Street that will probably go on all year. The brick sidewalk renovated by men of the church two years ago was removed, though we are told by the DOT that they will replace it "as was" at project's end. The final overhead wires and utility pole over our parking lot are scheduled to be removed when the street lighting on Walnut is re-routed. We certainly look forward to completion of construction!

Our major project this year was the removal of the old choir loft and modesty wall and reconfiguration of the choir seating. This was started in September, interrupted by the hurricane, and completed in time for Thanksgiving and Advent. Rick, Van, and Wes did the bulk of the work, and Morgan reset the overhead microphones. We hope you like the new appearance and notice improved sound of the choir during worship. [Photos of this project can be found in the Music Ministry's report on pg. 15]

Our elevator was down for several weeks at the end of the year due to a blown circuit board. It is possible that this part was faulty from the beginning and responsible for the multiple brief shutdowns we have experienced since the elevator's installation. We are hopeful that this is the end of our problems with the elevator.

[More Building & Grounds]

The inline duct heater for the sanctuary's heating system, which boosts the heat with gas flame when it is too cold for the electric heat pump to work efficiently, required replacement at the end of the year. The work was completed just in the nick of time to heat us through a long spell of very cold weather. This was a major repair covered by our Asset Replacement Fund.

Longtime member Nink Swift retired from the team this year, and we thank her for many years of service. We welcomed new member Charlotte Casey and, starting in 2025, our new chair, Eddie Hendrickson. Van Davis, Morgan McNeil, Lee Hays, Bo Prevost, and outgoing chair Rick Croskery round out the team.

We would be delighted to welcome new volunteers.

PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN

Ruth Circle is part of the International Ministry of Presbyterian Women which focuses on Spiritual growth, fellowship, and missions both locally and around the world. We meet nine months out of the year on the first Tuesday with attendance of 6 to 8 women.

In December we host a Christmas luncheon for all women of the church. This year the event was held at the Southern Porch in Canton which was enjoyed by 19. This was followed by our usual two-month hiatus because of the chance of wintry weather. It also gives " seasonal women" more opportunity to participate.

Every year a new Bible study is put out by Presbyterian Women and Horizons, a quarterly publication. In May we finished "Sacred Encounters: The Power and Presence of Jesus Christ in Luke-Acts" and then started Let Justice Roll Down: God's Call to Care for Neighbors and All Creation.

In September, Ruth Circle hosted The Fall Gathering for WNC Presbytery which was attended by approximately 50 women. It was quite an endeavor which could not have been accomplished without the help and support of several women in the congregation.

Each month there was a brief business meeting followed by the Bible study and sharing of prayer concerns. At the conclusion of the formal time, those who were able went out and shared a meal together which has been a long-standing tradition. Both were a fun time of fellowship and laughter for all who attended.

Our focus on missions can be seen in part, by the four offerings collected during the year. One of these is done monthly for the Black Mountain Home for Children which is used to buy a gift card from either Ingles or WalMart. These are given to the house parents when they need to purchase items to meet the needs of children in their care. This year our generous group of 6-8 women collected a total of \$690.

Please know that every woman in our church is part of the Presbyterian Women's ministry. Look for the notice of our monthly meetings in the church bulletin and join us in the Upper Room on the First Tuesday at 10:00.

Starting in February Earth Care moved from Buildings and Grounds to Discipleship. Also, in February Earth Care acquired glass communion cups and the Worship Committee agreed to switch the plastic communion cups which are thrown away, to the glass ones that are washed and reused each month.

Our first event was a series of videosentitled "Christianity and Climate Change", written and narrated by Katherine Hayhoe, a devout Christian and atmospheric scientist. The viewing and discussion on the videos took place In February, March and April. We watched 2 videos each session and discussed how they related to us personally and to the church. An example of the topics were: What the Bible says about the Natural World, What can we do as a church, and There can be a better future.

In April, in recognition of Earth Day, we once again put out the display of "Bad, Better, Best". The theme was to show the congregation how to move away from plastic and Styrofoam containers for everyday items and instead go for products that



come in recyclable or reusable containers, i.e. cardboard egg cartons verses Styrofoam cartons and reusable grocery bags verses plastic bags.

We had about a dozen examples which created quite a bit of conversation, usually starting with "I never thought of that."

On June 26 Earth Care hosted a"Help the Earth" potluck dinner and program. Zondra Kuykendall, Recycling Coordinator for Haywood County gave a very informative presentation. Recycling is something that most people practice to some extent and despite how much anyone knew or didn't know about recycling, we all learned something new. It was very well attended and generated a lot of questions and discussion.

On September 25 Earth Care again hosted a"Help the Earth" potluck dinner. This time the topic was Composting. We had a panel consisting of Sara Martin from Sustainabilties, Bonnie Refinski-Knight from Master Gardeners and Hans Hegges, owner of CompostAVL. Laura Armour from Grace Episcopal was the facilitator. In spite of terrible weather there was a great turnout. The idea of taking paper, food scraps, yard waste, etc. and turning them into a useful product to nourish the soil is catching on.

In December we collected unusable Christmas tree light strands. This type of item cannot be recycled in the normal recycling locations because it tangles up the machinery so therefore, it winds up in the landfill. Fortunately however, there is a company in Asheville that could take them. All toll we collected about 20/25 strands of lights. Yay, one more thing to keep out of the landfill!

Numbers can often drive home a point. Earth Care has been working on reducing the church's footprint in our community for several years.

We have changed from Styrofoam and paper cups, glasses and plates to reusable cups, glasses and plates. We now use reusable water bottles at the annual picnic instead of throw-away plastic bottles and we now use glass communion cups instead of plastic ones. Plus, we recycle all paper and cardboard. So, what does all that mean?

When you calculate the number of times we, the congregation meet for after-church refreshments, have covered dish luncheons or a picnic, hold special events involving food, partake in communion and recycle everything appropriate,

it turns out First Presbyterian Church of Waynesville kept around 10,000 pieces of garbage out of the landfill.

Way to go First Presbyterian Church of Waynesville! Pat yourselves on the back... you did good!!!!

Throughout 2024, the Earth Care Team staged a"Help The Earth" series of events on a variety of topics, including recycling composting, plastics and the environment, and climate change.

The events were will attended, and we all came away a little wiser, a little more caring. Plans for 2025 include a focus on sustainable gardening and landscap-



HURRICANE HELENE RELIEF EFFORTS

Our Mission Team and the Deacons have helped Haywood County recover from the devastation of the floods from Hurricane Helene.

Since October, the Mission Team has received and donated ove \$26,500. The money was sent to organizations in Haywood County to help people rebuild their lives. Mountain Projects' Emergency Assistance Fund, Haywood Christian Ministries' ARISE Recovery Fund, Haywood United Way Flood Recovery were given money both right after the floods and later when the true extent of the needs were known. Black Mountain Children's Home, which we have supported since it opened, was given a donation specially for flood recovery.

Physical items came from many places and people. Food, clothes, and bottled water came from South Carolina, Virginia, Missouri, Iowa, Florida and Asheville, and Whiteville, NC. Because of relationships with members of our congregation, people felt comfortable giving items to our church. The Mission Team gave the donated food to Haywood Christian Ministries. Water was given back to areas of Asheville which did not have pure water in October. Winter clothing went to Pathways Bethel House, and the B.E.A.R (babies equipment and resources) Closet of a local United Methodist Church. The National Honor Society group from a high school in Alexandria, Virginiasent 5 boxes filled with individual bags of personal hygiene supplies which were given last week to Pathways, HCM and REACH.

The Deacons were the recipient of generous donations from individuals in Florida and lowa which totaled \$7,000. A woman in Canton who had her private bridge washed out is being helped with funds. She is a member of the Canton Presbyterian Church which asked our church for extra help. As other people in need are found, the Deacons will be able to help them.

The Mission Team and the Deacons thank all who have helped Haywood County recover.

HCM PANTRY STOCKER BETH JOHNSON & MELONIE GROSS



The monthly food drives for Haywood Christian Ministry (HCM) continue to be a successful Mission project that supports the hungry and food insecure in Haywood County.

2024 was a tough year where HCM saw the

need increasing significantly first due to the closing of the Canton paper mill in June 2023 and

then with Hurricane Helene in September.

HCM had a harder time getting food from their suppliers. There was one positive for HCM from Helene — even though they were providing food for many, many more people, they were getting so many donations from all over the country from people wanting to

help flood victims and were able to give out more food to their recipients.

The Mission Team is allocated 10% of FPCW's budgeted income projection each year.

In 2024 that amounted to \$28,610, which allowed us to support seven western North Carolina not-for-profits, as well as the Reverend Dr. John McCall in Taiwan and the Honduras Eye Clinic.

We also distributed funds for the heat assistance programs of Haywood Christian Ministries and Mountain Projects, Inc. Please see the Mission Support Summary for details on pgs. 32 & 33.

We also collect donations for the four denominational special offerings:

One Great Hour of Sharing (near Easter), Pentecost (May/June), Peace and Global Witness (September/October) and the Christmas Joy Gift (December). 40% of the Pentecost offering stays with FPCW to be used in the support of at risk children, and we used the money (approximately \$190) to purchase a variety of books and workbooks for the Pathway's family shelter. 25% of the Peace and Global Witness offering stays with FPCW and the Mission Team sent those proceeds back to Presbytery to be used for the peace effort in Ukraine.

Smoky Mountain Housing Partnership (a division of Mountain Projects, Inc.), was the recipient of a \$20,000 grant from The Presbytery of Western North Carolina. A site "presentation" of the grant money was held on March 20 at their Bethel Village development off Jonathan Valley Road in Maggie Valley. Those in attendance also got to tour one of the new homes. FPC hopes to continue supporting SMHP at this development with some landscaping assistance in 2025.

In May we asked the congregation for donations to sponsor the costs for 40 graduating students from Haywood Community Learning Center (HCLC). The response was overwhelming! We covered the costs of the cap, gown, tassel and diploma cover for each graduate, as well as gave each a rose as they left the stage after receiving their diploma, plus

provided a rehearsal pizza lunch. In December we sent the remaining \$130 to HCLC to distribute to any students who were impacted by Helene. We also provided a monthly lunch during the school year for the students and staff. Many thanks to FPCW's cooks for making casseroles, salad and dessert!

In August, we collected money to purchase supplies for the teachers at Hazelwood Elementary School and once again FPCW came through in a big way with almost \$1,000! We purchased items the teachers requested - dry erase markers and erasers, pencils and pencil tip erasers, zipper pouch bags, colored pencils, facial tissue and 3"x3" sticky note pads for twenty-six classrooms.

In September the Mission Team, along with Session, sponsored Pathway's Holy Cow Food Truck for the Hunger Grant from The Presbytery of Western North Carolina. We are proud to announce that they received \$8,000. Normally Presbytery sends the check to us, and we present it to the recipient during Sunday worship. With the impacts from Helene still impacting so many, Presbytery sent the check directly to Pathways.

September 27, 2024— the day Hurricane Helene hit western North Carolina and wreaked devastation and flooding over such a large area of the state. While terrible, it brought out the best in so many people FPCW received so many donations for hurricane relief— both monetary and in tangible items of food, water, clothing, supplies— it was overwhelming. Donations came from our own congregation, as well as friends in South Carolina, Virginia, Missouri, Iowa, Florida and other parts of North Carolina.

The Mission Team distributed just over \$20,000 in October and December to Mountain Projects' Emergency Assistance Fund, Haywood Christian Ministries' ARISE Recovery Fund, Haywood United Way Flood Recovery and Black Mountain Children's Home. (Money continues coming in and will be distributed in 2025.) Food, diapers and paper goods were given to Haywood Christian Ministries, bottled water was given to areas of Asheville, winter clothing went to Pathways, Bethel House, HCM and the B.E.A.R. Closet at Francis Cove UMC, and boxes of individually bagged personal hygiene items went to Pathways, HCM and REACH.

December was a busy month. We collected mittens, gloves, hats and scarves for the Salvation Army's Mitten Tree. 15 seniors and 15 children were recipients of wish list items for the Salvation Army's Angel Tree. FPCW volunteers rang the bell for the Salvation Army's red kettle outside the Hazelwood Ingle's on December 12. The Mission Team also sent two LARGE boxes of empty, clean pill bottles to Matthew 25 Ministries in Ohio to be used for sending medicines around the world. Thank you once again to all who supported these worthwhile projects!


In addition to individual congregant support, the **Deacons are responsible for the Prayer Quilt Ministry and the Layette Ministry**.



- JANET TINGLE -


